For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven . . .

This “time” is soon arriving - a transition built right into the fabric and purpose of my ministry here all along. It’s a new beginning to be celebrated; but, like all partings, it has its sadness as well as its joy. After all, I have come to know many of you as friends as well as church members, and since I will continue to live here in the West-hampton community, I expect many of these friendships will continue.

My time as your interim has been busy and full, as well as fulfilling to me personally. I hope it has been fruitful and helpful to the church as well. I have thoroughly enjoyed learning about and sharing in so many of the wonderful aspects of your ministry and mission. These have included your Thanksgiving Harvest and Baskets, your sales and social events, including your Christmas Tea and Bazaar, your Rummage Sale, your Harvest Dinner, your Fundraising dinners, your Christmas Adopt-a-Family, your Summer Appeal, your fashion shows and other social events, such as the hot cross-bun breakfast at the Sunrise Service. So many of your social events also go to help the mission projects and programs your church promotes and supports. And, during the summer months and special occasions, it’s been a pleasure to lead services in your Quogue Chapel.

Rev. Vanessa Winters, whom you called as your Pastor beginning in January, will be serving a wonderful congregation, hopefully for many years to come. I pray that you and she will grow together and find ways to strengthen and expand the mission and ministry of WPC. While you will not see me at church or in worship for quite some time after the New Year, you will all be in my heart and in my prayers.

As you probably already know, once a Presbyterian pastor’s service in a church ends, he or she needs to give the new pastor an opportunity to develop a strong and healthy pastoral relationship with the congregation and its families. This means that for at least a year, I will not serve any official pastoral function at WPC, including at baptisms, funerals and weddings. These are times when families understandably desire a pastor they know and with whom they already have a personal relationship. However, these special and even tender times in a family’s life are also the very best times to establish pastoral ties with a new pastor. After all, it’s the new pastor who will come to be seen as “my pastor” to young children as they grow, are confirmed and are married themselves. So please do not ask me to participate in these events, as I will have to decline, though I will be holding you in my thoughts and prayers.

On a personal note, one of the most meaningful and powerful aspects of my ministry with you has been knowing just how strongly and deeply you have kept both myself and Linda in your prayers as we have gone through treatment for and continue to deal with cancer. Before I was your Interim Pastor, I could feel the love and energy you sent my way when you learned of my illness back in 2015 – before you even knew me. There has never been a moment I wasn’t aware of your love and support, and I want you to know how much I appreciate it.

WPC is a very strong and active congregation, and it has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve with you for the past 22 months. As you now look forward to a new chapter in your life as a community of faith, I wish you well, and promise that I will never forget the precious and valuable time I had together with you as your Interim Pastor. I will continue to hold you in prayer as I will cherish your prayers as well.

And please always remember that Christ is in us and we are in Him. We are well off in God, the Almighty, in God’s holiness, always.



End of Year Giving and the IRS

As you might imagine, the declaring of charitable gifts as tax deductions is highly regulated by the Internal Revenue Service. Since the end of the year quickly approaches, it seems an appropriate time to review those regulations.

Any gifts to the church should be in the church's "hands" by the end of the year. With the final Sunday being December 30th, the regular giving of offerings should be no problem for all who are able to attend worship that final day. If you are unable to worship with us on December 30th, and you wish to mail in your end-of-year pledges and gifts, the envelope must be postmarked no later than December 31, 2018, for that gift to be reported on your 2018 statement and thus be eligible as a deduction on your 2018 tax return.

For various reasons, some people like to prepay their following year's pledge. If you wish your 2019 giving to be deductible on your 2018 return, you must meet the above criteria. Be assured that the church sets aside prepayments for use in the following calendar year. Although you will receive the 2018 credit for the IRS, the funds will be applied to the 2019 expenses and budget. Just be sure to note on the memo line that it is 2019 giving.


A recent announcement in the Sunday bulletin raised a few questions. This announcement was about prepaying pledges and per capita, suggesting that you hold these payments until after the first of the new year. We apologize for any confusion. You alone decide which year should be credited for your giving. Do as you wish for any 2019 giving -- prepay it, or hold it for 2019.

However, the church is not going to worry about keeping records of *prepaid per capita*. Per capita is each person's share of supporting the Presbytery of Long Island, the Synod of the Northeast, and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Each of these bodies determines their portion each year. Westhampton Presbyterian Church will pay per capita for each active member on the church's rolls as of December 31, 2017. (This number is 314.)

For 2019, the per capita assessment is \$38.05, meaning that WPC will pay \$11,948 in 2019. Naturally enough, we encourage you to give the church your share. However, since fewer than one-third of the congregation does so, the numbers are not significant enough for us to worry about the actual date these per capita offerings are received. Again, the question as to which year your per capita offering is to be a tax deduction is entirely up to you. Prepay it if you wish; pay it next month if you wish.

By the way, with all this talk about prepayments, don't overlook the possibility of post payments. You might have noticed that the 2019 budget was prepared with a line for postpaid pledges, since we have received such payments in the past. If you do not meet your 2018 goal, don't hesitate to pay your shortage in 2019. If you do so, we would appreciate your noting on the memo line of the check "2018 postpaid." Thank you for your support of WPC's ministry and mission for our Lord and Savior.

Some History of Westhampton Presbyterian Church from Marcia Koziarz

The current church facility began with the construction in 1887-88 of the sanctuary and a small side room at its northwest corner. The dedication of the cornerstone was held on December 29, 1887. This cornerstone lies in the south exterior facade, just to the east of the west entrance, and covers the opening which contains a tin box originally filled with coins and newspapers from that era. A special centennial celebration of the sanctuary, and a rededication of this cornerstone, took place on Sunday, December 27, 1987, under the leadership of the Rev. Charles M. Cary, and with the participation of a few prior ministers or their sons. The small room, spoken of above, had an outside entrance on the south and provides two entrances into the sanctuary on the east, one at the front wall through the choir loft, and the other directly into the seating area of the sanctuary. Most likely the room itself was originally used as a robing room for the minister. Throughout the 1950s and 1960s, and perhaps earlier, it was the choir room. It is unknown, at this time, if the choir loft was part of the original construction.

First addition

In 1948, during the tenure of the Rev. John H. Hendrickson, a Parish Hall was built to the north and west of the sanctuary, connected to the sanctuary by the choir room. This new Parish Hall provided a large room for gatherings, meetings, and meals, with a kitchen and two restrooms on the east side. At the north end stands an enclosed stage set between two small classrooms. Each room had steps up to a door onto the stage, providing free movement to and from stage left and stage right, and so used during productions.

The west wall of the Parish Hall had windows and two French doors to the outside. These doors were used freely during the annual church picnics as they provided direct access to the parking lot and side yard. They saved a great many steps when carrying food from the kitchen out to the picnics. At the south end of the large room, there was a hall running alongside the choir room and leading to the front door. A room to the west was the minister's study with entrances from both the hallway and the large room. For the first time in over 200 years, the minister actually had a place to prepare sermons and to tend to other duties outside of his home. With this new front door, the original door in the choir room was replaced with a window. It could also be pointed out that for the very first time, the church had indoor plumbing. Prior to this, parishioners had to cross the street to use the bathroom in the manse or be satisfied with the outdoor privy.

Sunday School classes shared the large room. To help with the noise level, rolling dividers were built. They looked exactly like rolling blackboards, but instead of the slate board, acoustical ceiling tiles were mounted on the sides. These acted as temporary walls between the "rooms" and successfully muffled much of the noise generated by the children gathered around the classroom tables. The sanctuary, and occasionally the manse, continued to be used for classes when needed.
