A Word from your Pastor

Most pastors worry about what will happen if they become deathly ill on Saturday night without time to ask someone to fill in the next morning. But what I never expected was to wake up feeling physically fine, but with no voice. Not that I was hoarse or raspy. My voice was gone. As in, I could manage a whisper and some high-pitched squeaks, but that was it. The previous day at the church Christmas fair, I had spoken to a couple of church members who heard my failing voice and joked maybe I could do an interpretive dance instead. One even joked she would work on her best "Vanessa impression." But waking up on Sunday morning, my voice was worse, not better. In fact—almost completely absent. It was the first Sunday of Advent. Communion Sunday. A day full of announcements, a pageant rehearsal, with a hospice remembrance service in the afternoon.

It was early so I started texting, God bless technology. One of our members who directs local theatrical productions and is quite an actress herself agreed to read the sermon, I emailed it to her. The president of the Trustees agreed to open the service with the call to worship and prayer of confession. As I came in the door to the church one of the trustees asked me if there was anything I needed (most likely expecting me to ask her to turn on the heat), but agreed she could read the words for the offering. In the parking lot I met a retired English teacher who was willing to read the pastoral prayer and I ambushed a retired pastor into reading communion. Former teachers, deacons, and just plain good church folk stepped up to help. Not one said no to my whispers of desperation.

As the service started, I immediately felt better because I was never alone on the chancel. One person came to stand beside me, then the next, as they read through their parts of the service. Their different voices reflected not only their own personalities, but the diversity and breadth of gifts present in our congregation.

It is a singular experience to hear your own sermon read to you in front of 100 people. But it was also what I needed. I found myself feeling as though I was hearing those words directed at me, much in the same way the congregation does. It was a reminder of my own need for the Word. During the pastoral prayer, I felt the warmth and love of God's assurances wrapping themselves around me. My former English teacher did not let me down. He not only listened to and responded to prayer requests from the pews, he prayed with a faithfilled and loving voice, reminding us all of the power of prayer. I was able to sit and listen as my wonderful retired pastor presided at the communion table, and I was reminded that Jesus gave his blood and body for me too.

As the service finished, the charge and benediction was read by one of the deacons. As the words were laid upon me like a mantle of God's work on my shoulders to carry out into the world—I had tears in my eyes. This congregation had come together to help their pastor, on short notice. On no notice. They had supported and loved me in ways they weren't even aware of. Most of all, they had personified the body of Christ.

As we pastors are fond of reminding our congregation—the church is not a building, and it's certainly not the pastor. The church is the body of Christ, God's people, the people who show up each Sunday usually to listen, but occasionally to lead worship. Sometimes it is these people who nourish the souls of others, even their pastor's. On the first Sunday of Advent at Westhampton Presbyterian Church this year, I showed up without a voice, but I left with a sense that God is in this place. The Holy Spirit is still blowing through our sanctuary, often in ways that surprise us. And I thank God for that.

During the Thanking God trough the Offering, you may have noticed some fellow worshipers not giving anything in the collection plate.

There are several ways to give; pledge envelope, pew envelope, direct deposit and prepay. The pledge and pew envelopes are easily seen. Direct deposit is a way to have your giving amount deducted from your bank account once a month by filling out an authorization for the treasurer. Prepay is another way that some members have figured their finances and give an amount at the stewardship time for the coming year. So at the passing of the collection plate, there are worshipers who give prior by direct deposit or prepay and you will not see them not give during offering.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON CONCERT SERIES

The fundraising committee is excited to announce a new fundraiser!

The church will be hosting four concerts on Sunday afternoons at 3PM in the sanctuary. Performances will feature Ruth Bennett, Harpist on January 28th, Emma Ozman, Soprano on May 19th, the Red Door Chamber Players String Quartet on July 28th, and a Woodwind Trio on October 20th.

All of the performances will be approximately an hour in length and will feature a mix of traditional classical music and some lighter numbers.

Tickets for the concerts can be purchased individually, or for the entire series. Prices are \$30 for adults (\$100 for the series), \$15 for seniors and students ages 12-18 (\$50 for the series), and \$10 for children ages 5-11 (\$30 for the series). Tickets will be available during coffee hour, in the church office, and at Lynne's Cards and Gifts. You may also purchase tickets at the door.

Recently appointed (fall 2022) as Assistant Harp Professor at Boston Conservatory at Berklee, she has been the Principal Harpist with the Yucatan Symphony Orchestra in Mérida, Mexico since 2007. Maintaining an active schedule between the U.S. and Latin America, she has appeared frequently as soloist, orchestra member and educator throughout Mexico and Peru. She has performed with American Ballet Theater and The Metropolitan Opera and been invited as guest principal harpist with the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra in the U.K. as well as playing in several on and off Broadway shows.

Who is a Member?

If you've ever seen a membership list for our church you have probably been surprised to see people's names that you haven't seen in church in years, like some of our children who grew up here but long since have moved on with their lives and live far away. We haven't updated except when someone dies or sends us a letter saying that they won't be here any more. This didn't use to matter much as we didn't have to pay anything for their membership.

That isn't true any more. In order to keep the government of the church as a whole functioning a per capita (or per person) charge was instituted a number of years ago at the presbytery level. Right now it is nearly \$45 per person and it is a shame to pay that for all of those people whom we never see. So we formed a membership committee and asked the question "Who is a member?" The answer, from the Book of Order, is that a member is someone who comes to worship services, or contributes financially to the operation of the church, or is involved in the work of the church, say helping with scrap metal drives or overnighting with Maureen's Haven. Of course we hope that members will do most or all of these, but we established minimum criteria and started checking through the list.

Our investigation in 2023 came up with approximately 85 people who had not acted as members in some years, and in March we wrote each of them a letter saying that they would be removed at the end of the year if they didn't meet any of these criteria. It was necessary for them to respond. Full membership could continue if they at least paid their per capita or made a financial pledge or came to worship services.

Very few people responded at all and in late November the Session voted to cancel their memberships. It was also possible for people to ask to be put on the Friends list where there is no need to meet any of the three criteria, and a few people did that. The point is, no membership stays automatic— we needed to hear from each individual.

This sounds strict at first glance, but what is a church if members don't come or support us in any way? Of course it is easy to get back on the membership list. You know how to do it.
