Searching for a New Pastor

The first step in finding a new pastor is over. It involved looking closely at our church to find weaknesses and strengths and desires, plus deciding what we would like to have in our next pastor, and then putting what we learned into a document that the Presbytery would approve. The good news is that we received that approval on our first try back on August 14. This is a big step because the Presbytery is notorious for sending documents back for revision, and the Presbytery only meets once a month, so any revision means a month essentially wasted. Dick Anderson remembers that happening to him years ago when he was on the committee, and the frustration he felt at the time lost. It happened to us six years ago when the Committee on Ministry sent us back to make a change in our study. I made the change back at home in fifteen minutes, but we had to wait a whole month to have the COM approve it. You can imagine how happy we were this year when we were accepted the first time! We owe a lot to our Liaison Rev. Karen Crawford who offered suggestions throughout the revisions.

What they approved was a twelve-page description of our church including pictures. Potential ministers will find it on our website and know what we look like (including our ocean beach), our history, our people, our beliefs, what we feel good about and what needs improvement, and our wishes for the church. We will have some copies for you to read, but you will be able to find it yourself on our website and save us printing costs for such a long paper. Some of you will recognize quotes from the polls you filled out in June. We wouldn't be where we are, by the way, if the church members hadn't stepped up and filled those poll questions out so promptly. We had 81 replies, and everything in the document came from what was said in them. We believe that our church looks very strong and that we will get very good candidates interested in us.

The next thing that happens is that we come up with names to be on the Pastor Nominating Committee and vote them in on September 22 at a congregational meeting. Names can even be added from the floor at our meeting, and it isn't too late to let Mimi Wood (nominations chair) know of your interest. The work will involve many meetings and a great deal of reading application materials. We already have seven people interested.

Then we have to fill out paperwork on things like what salary we offer and things like that which require one more meeting with the Presbytery, so we won't be actively seeking a minister until mid-October. To us the months drag, but the Presbytery keeps reminding us to go slowly and take our time. Stu Wood, chair of the Mission Study Committee

CROP Walk 2024

With the coming of September, it's time to remember our fall CROP Walk, which this year falls on Sunday, October 20. We should be thinking about the fun of walking through Westhampton Beach in the crisp fall air with our friends, raising money for one of the best causes out there. Since 1946 Church World Service has been a faith-led organization partnering with individuals around the globe to walk alongside our most vulnerable neighbors in over 65 countries around the world. Thanks to volunteers and donors like us, people can find nutritious food, clean water, legal support and the other services they need to build the lives we all deserve.

In the last year CWS has supported 1,000 food banks, helped 4,500 refugees find safety in Kenya, provided better access to safe water and sanitation across Asia, and helped over 8,000 children in a refugee program in Egypt, plus much more. And remember, 25% of everything we raise will come back to our local food bank in the Roman Catholic church.

It's time to mentally commit to walking when the time comes, and for non-walkers, to mentally commit to supporting the walkers generously. Last year we raised \$2,765 with 15 walking. The walks offered will be one mile, two miles, or six miles. The rewards are infinite. See Stu Wood for details.

Please give thoughtful consideration to serving when we call. It takes an hour or two of your time each month.




HALF YEAR 2024 FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The half year 2024 ended on a cautious note in respect of the financial health of our church.

The year-to-date pledge goal is \$129,996 and the year-to-date actual giving is \$145,980, which means we have a positive difference between goal and actual of \$15,984. This is encouraging but the half year givings total is 15 below last year. Our monthly givings versus pledge are going down and anybody who pledged please review your pledge versus givings balance. Thank you!




The church's half year actual income year-to-date total is now \$249,537 and expenses \$230,152, which means the year-to-date difference between income and expense to \$19,385. This may look like a good positive difference, but it includes \$45,000 support from our M&E fund.



Our anticipated givings are 6.15% above the plan, but we need to understand that this includes pledge members which paid their giving in full at the beginning of the year. Therefore, the giving level will decline throughout the year, if any pledge member does not watch the actual giving and falls behind the pledge. Since the givings are our majority income for our church, this will have an impact on the church's financial health.

This is especially of importance, since lose plate and donations others are once again far behind plan. Lose plate is 28% behind the budgeted number and donations other is 23% behind plan, a total gap of \$9,000.

Our budgeted mission giving to the Presbytery for 2024 is a total of \$12,116. In the 1st half our Per Capita income was \$4,539, which means our church right now would need to compensate \$7,576 for members who have not yet contributed their Per Capita mission payment. We would like to ask you for your Per Capita giving of \$43.95, as it will greatly help our church to finance other activities. We thank you in advance!



If you want to contribute in different ways, we also have a list of consumables, equipment and supplies list on the message board. Any donation of either printer paper, software services or garden service etc. will help our financial and operating expenses.

Our church is blessed by your contributions, your support and all the volunteers who add to our financial stability. Hereby, we would like to express our sincere gratitude to all you!

Mission Committee

On Sunday June, 14, I gave a Minute for Mission regarding the ongoing needs of Father's House. Father's House WAS an orphanage/ transition center for traumatized orphaned and abused children. They were given care, psychological rehabilitation and transitioned into foster families. Families lived at Father's House with their own children and up to 5 fosters until they had adjusted to each other and were ready to move into their independent living situations. This was a beautiful thing. With the Russian invasion, the site in Kiev was deemed unsafe for the children and they were moved to Freiburg, Germany. It was a torturous journey and a difficult adjustment, but by now the children are speaking German, educated in German schools and adapting to German way of life. The German social service system meets their needs. The letter below, from Anne Elliott, our stateside contact person, details the current work of Father's House as well as other Christian Charitable Organizations. The need in Ukraine is endless and overwhelming. I hope you will have time to read Anne's letter and to consider how we might help these organizations. Thank you, Nalda Rothe, Mission Committee

Hi everyone - an update in these very hard times in Ukraine.

Lena, who started and runs Life at 100% rehabilitation home for mothers and children had a great tragedy in her family a month ago with the death of their soldier son, Arthur, fighting at the front. His photo is below. He was a true hero, and the video of his military outdoors funeral was extremely moving. Please pray for Lena, the family, and Ukraine. I was shocked at footage of rows of hundreds and hun-

dreds of graves of soldiers in the cemetery where Arthur is buried.

Previously, I had shared about the wiring fire that Life at 100% had and the need to completely redo the inside. Lena told me Arthur had done a lot of work to the home since it started, and he shared the same vision as her for mothers to receive rehabilitation for the sake of their children. So, Lena said she is 'full steam ahead' to get this home finished so that mothers and their children can move back in. Harvest City Church in Vancouver, Canada has been the main donor funding this house restoration. All that was left internally after the fire were the solid brick walls. The clean up was massive. There is now entirely new plumbing, wiring, fire safety features, heating system, new windows and doors, drywalling of walls and ceilings, tiling of bathrooms, laminate for the floor. I have included two photos of work in progress.

All the appliances, furniture, bedding etc. were destroyed and need to be replaced. If you feel you would like to donate towards this, it would be a great blessing.

There is a wonderful piece of news regarding the rehabilitation house. The Christian lady who owns it gave Lena the use of it for a rehabilitation house permanently. However, for \$55,000 we have the opportunity to purchase it. A generous individual donor and Light Church in San Diego have donated the funds to buy

it. Lena's non-profit and the seller's lawyers have completed the documents and the house sale will close on 25 July. Lena is so grateful.

She said she never dreamed this would ever be possible.

Now for an update on FATHER'S HOUSE. Bruce and I were in Freiburg, Germany at the end of April to informally visit with people from the 2 non-profits who assisted Father's House in their escape from Ukraine. All funding for the children to live in Germany comes from Germany Social Services and the 2 non-profits oversee the running of the homes, where the children live in family groups. It has been a challenging time to get to this point, but the children are now settled in their life in Germany. As time passes, there are children turning 18. Only one has opted to return to Ukraine at this time.

Back in Kyiv, Roma's daughters, Anastasia and Alina, are very capably running Father's House. Although it is no longer a children's home as such, it is being used in other ways, but continues its heart to help children in need. They are running programs for village disadvantaged children, displaced children and children suffering from war trauma from living in a constant state of fear. Through crafts and activities, they are identifying unique talents of children and working with them 'to reignite hope and possibility'. The



Father's House, Kyiv also provides accommodation to organizations serving children and families, and to medical teams who come to provide help and training. Humanitarian aid is sent to Father's House from other countries for distribution by them to orphanages, homes for the elderly and families in need. Funds can be sent through Ezra to help Father's House and we pass them straight on. CHILD RESCUE MOBILE UNIT update - On our way to Freiburg we visited Vera in Basel, Switzerland.
